LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: God Hears Our Prayers SCRIPTURE: James 5; 1 Thessalonians 5 WORD OF WONDER: From Psalm 66:19–20

Pause now to read James 5:13–18.

When I first heard the term, divine expectation, I immediately fell in love with it.

The friend who used it was describing a tough situation. His wife was seriously ill and slowly growing weaker. And though he was juggling kids, a career, and serving as a part-time caregiver, he never left home without pausing to kiss his wife and then checking to see that her jogging shoes were by the door.

"We used to run every day," he said. "I'm praying she recovers, and when that happens, I want to be sure her jogging shoes are where she can find them."

That's a guy who prayed with faith. He had faith that God is, that God was listening, and that God loved his wife. He trusted God wanted the best for his wife, and, as far as my friend was concerned, that best would include one day again lacing up those shoes.

This isn't a miraculous healing story. His wife eventually died, and my friend eventually placed her shoes in a box he carried to a secondhand store so someone else could use them.

Praying with faith doesn't necessarily mean God will say "yes" to your every request. But it does mean you trust He hears you and will respond. And it means you look for and praise Him in whatever response He gives you.

How will you faithfully pray with divine expectation today?

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LESSON 4 FOR LEADERS PRAY WITH FAITH

DID YOU KNOW?

FOUNDATION BUILDING BLOCKS

WHO?

First Thessalonians was written by Paul to the church in Thessalonica, and from early Christian history, James, the brother of Jesus, has been understood to be the author of the letter of James (Galatians 1:19). Both authors emphasize the need for faithful, consistent prayer.

WHAT?

These letters are very different in structure and purpose. First Thessalonians addresses the specific situation of believers who were concerned that Jesus would not return. James is a letter of general wisdom meant to circulate among different churches.

WHERE?

The letter of James is addressed to the "12 tribes scattered among the nations" (James 1:1), which may refer to all the Gentiles who believe in Jesus. Thessalonica, however, is located in northern Greece.

WHEN?

Some people think that 1 Thessalonians is the earliest written document in the New Testament, perhaps written in the late 40s or early 50s. James died around the year 62, and many scholars think his letter was written a few years earlier.

CONNECTING TO GOD'S BIG STORY

Jesus first taught His disciples to "always pray and not give up" (Luke 18:1). Both Paul and James thus draw upon the teachings of Jesus in their statements about prayer.



Curiosity

LESSON 4 EARLY CHILDHOOD

Spark curiosity, encourage exploration, and get kids thinking about the wonder of God.

LESSON AT A GLANCE

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Curiosity Activity: Feeling Prayers

SUPPLIES: disposable plastic plate, googly eyes (2), dry-erase marker, tissue, glue (prep only)

Before kids arrive, glue two googly eyes on a plastic plate. Use the dry-erase marker to draw a smiling mouth on the plate.

Hold up the plate with the smiley face. Here's a face that is happy and smiling! Can you show me your happy face? Allow kids to respond. I love your happy faces. We can pray and talk to God when we are happy!

Use the tissue to erase the smile from the plate and draw a frown. Uh-oh. Now our friend is sad. Can you show me your sad face? Allow kids to respond. We can pray and talk to God when we are sad!

Use the tissue to erase the frown from the plate and draw a circle for the mouth to represent a scared face. Now our friend is scared. Can we pray and talk to God when we are scared? Yes, we can!

We can pray and talk to God when we're happy, sad, or scared! We can talk to God all the time. God hears our prayers!

Our Wonder Truth today is GOD HEARS OUR PRAYERS.

Encourage the kids to do the following motions while you repeat the Wonder Truth. Older toddlers can say the words with you as they do the motions.

GOD—Point up.

HEARS—Cup ears.

OUR PRAYERS.—*Praying hands.*

2s - Power of Prayer - Lesson 4 - May 26







Guide kids into knowing God more deeply, exploring His big story, and marveling at His wonder.

LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: God Hears Our Prayers SCRIPTURE: James 5; 1 Thessalonians 5 WORD OF WONDER: From Psalm 66:19–20

Prayer of Invitation

Before entering into God's big story, lead kids in a prayer of invitation. Use the prayer here or your own words: Father God, we know that You always hear our prayers. Help us hear from You today. As we worship You and hear Your Word today, help us remember that You hear us and want to spend time with us. In Jesus' name, Amen.

God's Big Story

**Note to leaders: This story is not in our picture Bibles. You can use the prayer strips and the script in your Belief bag to aid in telling the story.

Pull out the Bible.

Ask: What is this called? The Bible

Ask: Why is the Bible important? Because it is God's word. Everything in it is true. It really happened.

TELL THE BIBLE STORY

Read James 5:13-18 and 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 NiRV from the text below:

¹³ Is anyone among you in trouble? Then that person should pray. Is anyone among you happy? Then that person should sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Is anyone among you sick? Then that person should send for the elders of the church to pray over them.

They should ask the elders to anoint them with olive oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ The prayer offered by those who have faith will make the sick person well. The Lord will heal them. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. ¹⁶ So confess your sins to one another. Pray for one another so that you might be healed. The prayer of a godly person is powerful. Things happen because of it.

¹⁷ Elijah was a human being, just as we are. He prayed hard that it wouldn't rain. And it didn't rain on the land for three and a half years. ¹⁸ Then he prayed again. That time it rained. And the earth produced its crops.

¹⁶ Always be joyful.
¹⁷ Never stop praying.
¹⁸ Give thanks no matter what happens.
God wants you to thank him because you believe in Christ Jesus.

Word of Wonder



But God has surely listened. He has heard my prayer. Give praise to God.

— Psalm 66:19–20a

Encourage the kids to do the motions and say the verse with you.

Gather kids to discuss these questions:

- What have you prayed and asked God about?
- What does it mean to praise God?



Identity

LESSON 4 EARLY CHILDHOOD

Create space for God to remind kids they are known, loved, led, and their lives can tell of God's wonder. **LESSON AT A GLANCE**

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Activity: Prayer Bear

SUPPLIES: teddy bear

Hold up a teddy bear and show it to the kids.

This is our Prayer Bear! Prayer Bear reminds us that we can pray anywhere! I am going to hide Prayer Bear somewhere in our room, and let's see who can find him! You will find him in places we can pray.

Hide the bear in various places around the room and let the kids find it. Ask questions about each place. For example, you could hide the bear at the snack table and then say: **"Prayer Bear was at the snack table! Can we pray to God during snack time?"** Or you could hide the bear with the toys and say, **"Prayer Bear was playing! Can we pray to God when we play?"**

Prayer bear reminds us that we can pray anywhere, and God hears our prayers!

Prayer and Blessing

After the kids finish their activity, pray with them, thanking God for hearing our prayers.

God, thank You for hearing our prayers. Help us to always remember to pray and talk with You! In Jesus' name, Amen.

Encourage the kids to hold their hands out in front of them, with palms up, as if their hands were open to receive something. Tell them to listen and receive the blessing as you speak it over them.

Blessing: May you always remember that you can pray anywhere, anytime. May you remember that you can pray no matter how you are feeling or what is going on. May you always remember that God hears our prayers.
