LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: God Shows Us How to Love SCRIPTURE: 1 Corinthians 13 WORD OF WONDER: 1 Corinthians 13:13 (NIrV)

"Can't Buy Me Love" by the Beatles was a crazy popular song back in the 1960s. Its message is clear: You can't buy love.

So how do we find love? And maybe more importantly, how do we share love?

In 1 Corinthians 13:1–8, Paul writes that we can have many spiritual gifts, knowledge, and money, but if we lack God's love, we truly have nothing. To make matters more challenging, he writes in verse 12, "For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror" (NIV). Our knowledge, our hope, even our understanding of God's love are not yet complete—they are like looking in a fogged-up mirror. We can wipe it, but our reflection remains hazy.

So if the mirror is fogged up, how can we understand what God's love is all about?

We will only know it by entering into a sweet relationship with Jesus. He's the only one who can fully wipe away the fog. He's the one who knows us and understands how to love us.

Take a moment to read 1 Corinthians 13:1-8, 12-13.

As you consider these words of Paul, what could you do to get a clearer vision of God's love for you? Have you let yourself be fully embraced by Him, or are there parts of you that you hold back? What might it look like to share this kind of love with those around you?

Sit back and lean into Jesus, who knows you and wants you to fully know Him.

DID YOU KNOW?

FOUNDATION BUILDING BLOCKS

WHO?

The Christians of Corinth were part of a church planted by Paul on his second missionary journey. Reflecting their culture, the Corinthians were highly conscious of social class and speaking skill. Paul addresses their tendency to divide into factions and fan clubs.

WHAT?

Paul treats a mirror as an object that obscures (1 Corinthians 13:12). Ancient mirrors were made of bronze and had none of the clarity of glass. An imperfect image from a dark mirror illustrates the way we presently "see" and "know."

WHERE?

Corinth, the capital of Achaia, was a city with a blended Greek and Roman culture. Because of its important role in trade—Paul himself worked as a tentmaker in Corinth (Acts 18:3)—there existed a great divide between rich and poor.

WHEN?

In Acts 18:11, Luke notes Paul's residence in Corinth for 18 months. Paul and the Corinthians exchanged letters over what were probably several years. Paul requests their financial support and mentions his plan to return in person (2 Corinthians 8:8–12; 10:2).

CONNECTING TO GOD'S BIG STORY

Jesus commands us to love our "enemies," including those outside the community of faith (Matthew 5:44). In 1 Corinthians 13, Paul describes patient love within the church—the body of Christ. If Jesus' followers can't patiently bear with one another, they can't possibly love their enemies.

LESSON 2 EARLY CHILDHOOD

Spark curiosity, encourage exploration, and get kids thinking about the wonder of God. **LESSON AT A GLANCE**

WONDER TRUTH: God Shows Us How to Love

SCRIPTURE: 1 Corinthians 13

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Heart Matching

SUPPLIES: red, pink, and purple cardstock (1 sheet of each color), large foam hearts (3, optional)

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: Heart Sheets

Ahead of time, print the Heart Sheets onto the cardstock. Cut the shapes out and then cut them down the middle to create different cut patterns. Mix up the pieces and place them on the table. You could also use different cut patterns down the middle of three large foam hearts.

Encourage the kids to pick a specific color heart and put its pieces together. Guide kids by showing them how the pieces fit together to make a heart. Assist kids when they are uncertain.

Hold a couple pieces of the hearts up near each other like they are about to be put together. I have some hearts here. Hearts make us think of love. But these hearts are

broken. Let's put them back together! I'll show you how. Show the kids how to put the correct pieces together.

You all did such a good job putting these hearts back together. We're going to learn more about love and about God showing us how to love today.

Our Wonder Truth today is GOD SHOWS US HOW TO LOVE.

Encourage the kids to do the following motions while you repeat the Wonder Truth. Older toddlers can say the words with you as they do the motions.

GOD-Raise both arms up overhead and point to the sky

SHOWS US—Point toward your chest with both thumbs.

HOW TO LOVE.—Give yourself a hug.

Guide kids into knowing God more deeply, exploring His big story, and marveling at His wonder.

LESSON AT A GLANCE

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Prayer of Invitation

Before entering into God's big story, lead kids in a prayer of invitation. Use the prayer here or your own words: God, thank You for every kid and leader here today. Help us learn from You and show us how to love others like You do. We thank You for Your love, which never fails. In Jesus' name, Amen.

God's Big Story

Note to leaders: There is no story in our picture Bibles for today's lesson. You can read the verses and use the summary below to tell the Bible story.

Pull out the Bible.

Ask: What is this called? The Bible

Ask: Why is the Bible important? Because it is God's word. Everything in it is true. It really happened.

TELLTHE BIBLE STORY

Read from the passage below, 1 Corinthians 13: 1-8, 12 Love Never Fails

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9:00 Service

13 Suppose I speak in the languages of human beings or of angels. If I don't have love, I am only a loud gong or a noisy cymbal. ² Suppose I have the gift of prophecy. Suppose I can understand all the secret things of God and know everything about him. And suppose I have enough faith to move mountains. If I don't have love, I am nothing at all. ³ Suppose I give everything I have to poor people. And suppose I give myself over to a difficult life so I can brag. If I don't have love, I get nothing at all.

⁴ Love is patient. Love is kind. It does not want what belongs to others. It does not brag. It is not proud. ⁵ It does not dishonor other people. It does not look out for its own interests. It does not easily become angry. It does not keep

track of other people's wrongs. ⁶ Love is not happy with evil. But it is full of joy when the truth is spoken. ⁷ It always protects. It always trusts. It always hopes. It never gives up.

⁸ Love never fails. But prophecy will pass away. Speaking in languages that had not been known before will end. And knowledge will pass away.

¹² Now we see only a dim likeness of things. It is as if we were seeing them in a foggy mirror. But someday we will see clearly. We will see face to face. What I know now is not complete. But someday I will know completely, just as God knows me completely.

Leaders: As you read the verses and summary, have the kids make a heart with their hands each time you say the word "love".

The Apostle Paul followed Jesus and wanted others to follow Jesus too! Paul became a missionary. A missionary's job is to visit different towns and tell others about Jesus. Paul wrote lots of letters. You might even call Paul's letters **love** letters because Paul wanted to teach people how God wants us to **love** each other. Paul wrote a letter to a group of Christians who lived in a city called Corinth. In this letter Paul told them the most important thing. Can you guess what it is?

Allow kids to try and guess the most important thing.

Is anyone else curious about the most important thing for followers of Jesus? Let's do a drumroll. **Show kids** how to do a drumroll by patting your legs quickly with your hands. The answer is love.

The word **love** can mean a lot of things, but Paul means the kind of **love** that makes us patient and kind to one another. **Love** makes us able to forgive when someone treats us badly, and **love** keeps us from being angry. **Love** means we stand up for others. **Love** is not happy with evil. **Love** is full of joy! **Love** is the most important thing because it always protects, trusts, and hopes. Paul says that "**love** never fails (1 Corinthians 13:8), and he's right!

Above all, **love** makes us like Jesus. It was Jesus' **love** that made Him give up His life so we can be forgiven. What makes us most like Jesus is showing others the same **love**. God shows us how to **love**.

Word of Wonder

WORD OF WONDER

The three most important things to have are faith, hope and love. But the greatest of them is love.

—1 Corinthians 13:13 (NIrV)

Encourage the kids to do the motions and say the verse with you.

Gather kids to discuss these questions:

- Can you name someone who has a lot of faith and hope?
- Share about someone in your life who is very loving. What does that person do that is loving?

Create space for God to remind kids they are known, loved, led, and their lives can tell of God's wonder.

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Heart Walk

SUPPLIES: tape, scissors (prep only), cardstock (optional)

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: Heart Sheets (1 heart per kid), music from the Early Childhood flashdrive.

Ahead of time, print the Heart Sheets and cut out one heart for each kid. Tape the Heart Sheets to the floor in the shape of a circle. For extra durability, you may want to print on cardstock.

Today we're going to take a "walk in love" around our circle of hearts as the music plays. Play music from the flashdrive as you lead the kids around the circle a few times.



Isn't it wonderful that God shows us how to love? When finished, invite the kids to cheer as they thank God for His love.

Prayer

After the kids finish their activity, pray with them, thanking God for helping us to be like Jesus and showing us how to love.
