LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: No Matter What, God Keeps His Promises

SCRIPTURE: Genesis 25–27

WORD OF WONDER: From Psalm 90:2

I grew up with a twin, and we sometimes engaged in "battles" growing up. I can identify somewhat with Jacob and Esau. When my twin sister and I were little, we once decided to swap identities to fool our family. We wore hats, switched clothes, and walked into the family room, declaring ourselves with each other's names. Our parents knew who we were, and the ruse ended before it started!

We can probably all identify in ways with both Jacob, who tricked his brother to get what he thought he deserved, and Esau, who was deceived.

Read Genesis 25:29–34. In this story, the birthright was more than just a physical inheritance. Birthrights involved becoming the head of the family and spiritual leader when the father passed. And for this family, it involved inheriting the covenant God had made with Abraham—the promise of a land, a nation, and blessing the world.

God wasn't thrown off by Jacob's actions, just as my own parents weren't fooled by my attempted trick as a child. His plans prevailed even when His people deceived, acted foolishly, and sinned. God doesn't withhold His love from us when we act foolishly either.

We have access to an eternal inheritance and birthright in the family of God through Jesus, and it doesn't depend on our character or actions, but on the character of God. He is faithful to keep His promises no matter what.

DID YOU KNOW?

FOUNDATION BUILDING BLOCKS

WHO?

Jacob and Esau were the twin sons of Isaac. They were in conflict with each other from the womb. Jacob, although the youngest, deceived his brother and father and gained both the birthright and blessing that should have belonged to Esau.

WHAT?

A birthright and a blessing were generally reserved for the oldest son. The birthright gave the recipient a double portion of the inheritance, among other privileges, and the blessing gave the recipient blessing, favor, and family headship.

WHERE?

Esau preferred the open country. He was a skilled hunter and was often outdoors. His descendants were the nation of Edom. Jacob was a quiet man who spent most of his time closer to home. Jacob's descendants were the nation of Israel.

WHEN?

After Isaac's mother Sarah died when he was 40 years old, Isaac married Rebekah. When he was close to his own death, Isaac blessed Jacob.

CONNECTING TO GOD'S BIG STORY

God made a covenant with Abraham and kept His promise through Abraham's grandson Jacob. Despite Jacob's deception and trickery, God still worked through Jacob to keep His promise to Abraham's family, making them a great nation and blessing the world through Jacob's descendant, Jesus.



LESSON 3 EARLY CHILDHOOD

Play Stations

SUPPLIES: bin, various dried beans, scoops or spoons, bowls, coloring utensils **Wonder Ink RESOURCES:** Jacob and Esau Coloring Sheet (1 per kid)

Greet the kids warmly and briefly explain the play stations to them. Invite them to play at any of the stations.

Welcome to church! While we're getting ready to start, you can play at any of these stations to help you get ready for our lesson today. Do you have any ideas about what we'll be learning today?

Play Station: Esau's Sensory Soup

Set up: Set out a bin filled with various dried beans, scoops or spoons, and bowls. Watch closely to make sure the kids don't put the beans in their mouths or noses, and be aware of skin allergies.

Play: Let the kids play with the beans, allowing them to scoop and pour.

Play Station: Jacob and Esau Coloring Sheet

Set up: Print one copy per kid of the coloring sheet and set out the coloring utensils.

Play: Let the kids color. The kids can also turn the sheet over and draw a picture of a sibling or family member.

Prayer of Invitation

Before entering into God's big story, lead kids in a prayer of invitation. Use the prayer here or your own words: God, we're thankful we get to be together today. Help us learn more about You and Your love for us. Help us understand that You are the God who keeps Your promises not matter what! In Jesus' name, Amen.

God's Big Story

Pull out the Bible

Ask: What is this called? The Bible

Ask: Why is the Bible special? **Because it is God's word. Everything in it is true. It really happened.**Tell the Bible Story

The Beginner's Bible, pages 58-62 Isaac's Blessing

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Who was Isaac's dad? (Abraham)
- What were the names of Isaac and Rebekah's twin sons? (Jacob and Esau)
- What did Esau have that Jacob wanted? How did Jacob get what he wanted? (the birthright; Jacob tricked Esau with a bowl of stew)
- What is your favorite soup or stew?
- Has anyone ever broken a promise to you? Have you ever been tricked? How did you feel?
- Name one promise God makes to us. (If kids need help, offer ideas such as: hearing our prayers, giving us what we need, forgiving us, loving us, helping us.)
- Even though Abraham's family made a big mistake, God still kept His promise to them. How does it make you feel to know you can trust God to be faithful to you too?

LESSON 3 EARLY CHILDHOOD

Craft: Hairy Bracelets

SUPPLIES: empty toilet paper tubes (1 per kid), scissors (prep only), cotton balls (several per kid), glue sticks

You'll need one empty toilet paper tube for each kid (or paper towel tubes can be cut in half). Cut toilet paper tubes so they are in 3-inchlong "bracelets." (See example.) Set out toilet paper tubes.

In God's big story today, we heard about two brothers who didn't get along very well. One brother was extra hairy—do you remember his name? Allow kids to answer. Esau! Esau was very hairy, and his brother,



Jacob, used hairy goat skin coverings to trick their father, Isaac. Today we're going to make our own version of Jacob's goat skin coverings.

Give each kid a set of supplies. Encourage the kids to glue cotton balls onto the toilet paper tube bracelets. Once the glue dries, the kids can put their bracelets on.

God is faithful! That means we can trust Him. He keeps His promises. Take your craft home as a reminder of how faithful God was to the family of Abraham, including Jacob and Esau, and how He is faithful to us, no matter what!
