Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

To Him be the glory, both now and to the day of eternity.

—2 Peter 3:18 (NASB)

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many.

-Mark 10:45 (NASB)

OPROCIAIM .

And so the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of great joy which will be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

—Luke 2:10–11 (NASB)

These words that the angel spoke to the shepherds changed the course of human history. On this night in Bethlehem, God's promise—a long-awaited prophecy—took on flesh. The Savior had finally arrived—not as a conquering King as many Jews were expecting—but as a newborn babe. It was not the elite or educated of society that were the first to hear this long-awaited news. The angel shared this message instead with lowly shepherds.

The message of the angel should resonate with all believers still to this day. The Good News is not just that Jesus was born, but that He still lives and is the only way to God. Only Christ's offer of forgiveness of sins will bring reconciliation to God the Father and eternal life.

Jesus, our Savior, brings peace to troubled hearts and the promise of lasting joy that no earthly circumstance can remove. The true delight of the Christmas season is in the presence and relationship of the One who came to redeem us.

Not abandoning our own meeting together, as is the habit of some people, but encouraging *one another*.

—Hebrews 10:25 (NASB)

Christmas is unique in that many people who do not regularly attend church often will attend a service in December. Whether out of guilt, curiosity, or a sense of longing, it is at this time of year that some people find themselves sitting in a service, often in the back row, contemplating what the significance of church really means.

God's Word clearly encourages believers in Christ to gather with one another. The purpose in our meeting together is not so that we can check off something on our heavenly to-do list. Christians see this as a time where we get to be together. We get to hear God's Word taught and proclaimed, we get to pray with and for one another, and we get to encourage each other that the trials of this life won't last forever because Heaven is waiting for us.

Because so many people are willing to go to church at Christmastime, pray about who you can invite to join you. And if the people you need to invite to church are not yet a believer in Christ, give them the greatest gift you could ever give them—the gift of the gospel message.



Lord, sometimes I take going to church for granted and for that I am so sorry. Give me new eyes to see what a blessing it is to be surrounded by other believers in Jesus. Help me to readily pray for and encourage others so that Your name will be glorified. In the name of Christ I pray, Amen.



Therefore, as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in Him, having been firmly rooted and now being built up in Him and established in your faith, just as you were instructed, and overflowing with gratitude.

—Colossians 2:6–7 (NASB)

Like roots of a tree that hold it steady and keep it strong, our faith must be firmly grounded in Christ. When this is the case, we cannot be swayed by the things in the culture and in the world around us.
